By about mid-year 2011 the structure and finished exterior of the church will have been completed including the dome. Through the total commitment of many parishioners, the Capital Campaign Fund contains the cash necessary to complete this first stage of construction.

Your Capital Campaign Committee has turned to the task of raising the balance of funds needed to complete the church interior and related site improvements on our property. Our goal is to provide a continuous cash flow to enable completion of the project in 2011. Approximately only one -half of our parishioners have committed close to 75% of the funds needed to complete the project and many have already made substantial payments on their commitments. With that record of parish commitment to date, we are hopeful others among our fellow parishioners will also now join in supporting this historic undertaking.

To complete the project this year, we need to raise approximately \$400,000 in cash, inclusive of remaining 3-year commitments yet to be paid. We will be pursuing various approaches to raising the funds needed to complete the project this year including new commitments from as yet uncommitted parishioners, increased commitments, accelerated payments on existing commitments and commitments from outside businesses who have supported the parish in the past and with whom we enjoy mutually beneficial relationships.

Later this year, we will also unveil a program of dedications of various spaces, fixtures and ecclesiastical features in the new church and in the new Paulos Center Addition. The Dedications Program, as introduced at the February 27th General Assembly, will provide opportunities to parishioners who desire to make special contributions in honor or in memory of loved ones or who simply want to make a donation for a special purpose or part of the church project, even if anonymously. This program will be delayed somewhat while we focus first on obtaining the funds to finish the church building and site improvements construction this year.

what hunger is, we don't even know what it is not having meat even for one day. This was not the case for many generations before us, during the war, the depression and so on. We live in abundance, and it is nothing wrong with that, but in the same time, if we don't pay attention can make us lazy and ungrateful.

An easy cure is the prescribed fasting discipline of the Orthodox Church. With two days a week of fasting and four major Lenten periods, the Church asks us to meditate upon all we have, by giving them away, temporarily.


But fasting is not only about food. From a spiritual perspective the same apply. We are born under grace; we are part of the One Holy Church of Christ since infancy. We have received the gift of Baptism as children and we have partaken in Christ's Body ever-since. The Resurrection of Christ is

for us many times something of the past, something that was done for us and we enjoy its fruits today. We don't know anymore what is to wait for the moment when the time "is ripe", to long for the coming of the Messiah. For us the Anointed One is here already. But He should never be perceived as One from the past, but a very actual presence. The cycle of Feasts and Fasting of the Liturgical year helps us in this respect reminding us again and again the immediacy of all the events that happened for our salvation. The great self chosen discipline of the Lent is forcing us, spoiled children as we are, to realize what great things have already been done for us and how many things we are taking for granted.

The expectation set forth by the Great Lent has enormous transforming power. If we could just let ourselves be embarked in this journey we could be molded into God's shape, we could be ascending towards His likeness through the means the Church is offering us: repentance, prayer, fasting and charity.

But you might very well say I don't need transformation, I'm as good as I can get. A losing proposition. That is exactly what the self-righteous Pharisee said, and yet, God loved more the sinful but repentant Publican.

The comfort of our lives is a great brake in our development as Christians. It gives us a false impression of achievement. The American dream is liberty and the pursuit of happiness. We have achieved this goal in our great country. We are free and happy with our lives today, so many times we don't see any need for more and we stop our engines midway. Oppression and hunger, material or spiritual, on the other hand, is a stimulant. Think of the Greek Church during the Turkish domination, how it has sur-(Continued on page 8)

Building Committee Report

Foundation work has now been completed which clearly defines the actual configuration of the Church and exo-Narthex. With all of the concrete pours completed for the engineered piers drilled to bedrock, four foot deep grade beams and the solid six inch slab the foundation is now ready for the building to take shape. April will be a busy month to begin the structural steel erection and wood framing. Asthton Wynne is projecting to have the main steel members and dome structure erected by Pascha, which would be a significant visual sign of our progress for the many parishioners and visitors attending services during Holy Week.

The Building Committee is continuing to meet regularly with Ashton Wynne to status progress and to ensure we are maintaining cost controls. In the coming month we will be developing a mock-up of the exterior brick, stone and roof materials to review; more details will follow on the actual timing of the mock-

up.

On Sunday November 14, 2010 we held our annual stewardship Sunday. It was for all a moment of reflection about our contribution to the Church for the year to come. Many thanks to all that participated and became stewards of our church.

Of course not everyone had an opportunity to come, but it is not too late! So here is some information on what it means and why is important to become a steward.

You become an Orthodox Christian Steward by giving yourself to Christ, by participating in the Sacramental Life of the church and by giving of your Time, Talent and Treasure; all of which require commitment. A commitment to worship, to attend liturgy and to pray regularly, a commitment to be an active part of your church community giving of your time and talent, and, yes, a commitment to give back a portion of the treasure God has given you - a financial commitment .

A written statement of your intentions is just one of the things that will help you feel committed to Christ and His Church. If we submit nothing in writing it is easy to just walk away and become a spectator. If, however, we have committed to help support the church, we feel an obligation to do so. That commitment comes by way of our Stewardship Commitment Card.

Filling out a Stewardship Card enables the church to keep a record of the number of parishioners in our congregation, to update addresses and phone numbers that are needed for various purposes and to assess the talents of our parishioners to be utilized when needed. The card is absolutely necessary to determine expected income for budgetary reasons and to create a list of church members who are eligible to vote, serve on the parish council, hold an office, share their talents etc.

So, please, don't stand on the outside looking in. Become an active part of St. John the Baptist community for 2011.

New cards are available in the pews and in the narthex.

Don't be afraid; the card is not a contract, but a promise of intentions. And remember: <u>If</u> <u>your intention is to be a</u> <u>pledged member of St. John, a</u> <u>new card must be submitted</u> <u>each year.</u>



The Hymns Of The Lamentations "Engomia"

Holy Friday night culminates with a memorable reenactment of the lamentations, the liturgical hymns of ancient centuries. The tone is mournful and the mood is solemn as the hymns are chanted by the clergy, choir, chanters and congregation.

The Lamentations are divided into three categories called stases. These psalms are the lament of women and men that see the dead Jesus. The peak of the psalms is the troparion of the Epitaphios (Epitaph, bier),

on Pascha Sunday after the Agape Vespers and before the Agape Luncheon. Donations for the egg hunt are requested (i.e. prizes, non-chocolate candy, etc...). There is a box labeled for egg hunt donations in the church hall for your convenience. Please come and join the fun. It's wonderful to see our young ones so carefree.

which is known in Greek as the "Ai geneai pasai", which means all the generations, all people. It is supposed to be the lament of Virgin Mary when she sees her son dead. It is a combination of sorrow and devout concentration. The most known of the hymns of Good Friday is "O gliki mou aear". It is the most touching and moving psalms, composed probably by Romanos Melodos – although this is not something completely confirmed.-Oh, my sweet spring time, my most beloved Child, whither has Thy beauty sunk down? The words are carefully chosen; Virgin Mary refers to her son as the Spring, referring to the setting of the sun, parallelizing the death with the sunset. All generations (ai genee pasai) praise by hymns his burial. This Easter troparion – hymn is definitely the most melodic of all, and the one stirring the senses more than anything else, since the Spring of life is lost and people see life being buried.



vived miraculously and did not cease to give Saints to God. Think about the Church under the Communist regime and the martyrs that never gave up hope. Also look today how many people from the Orthodox majority in those countries attend Divine Liturgy on Sundays. The statistics are downright depressing. All this happens because freedom is misunderstood and abundance becomes the only expression of happiness and the very goal of life.

St. Seraphim of Sarov comes to say differently, that the goal of life is acquiring the Holy Spirit. Live a life full of the true Spirit and your dreams of liberty and happiness will be attained for eternity. If we want this to become reality we have to break from the false sense of achievement that our prosperity is inducing on us, and realize that we are far from our target in a true spiritual sense.

We have to acknowledge our shortcomings, get rid of the

mask of pride and unveil the humility residing in the image of Christ within us. God emptied Himself of His glory and has shown us that under His ineffable glory, that can be very intimidating, lays great love for mankind; love that allowed Him to go as far as to sacrifice Himself so we can have life.

Our goal should be the same, to empty ourselves of the vain glory of spurious achievement that whispers in our years: you're good, you're smart, you're spiritual, and realize that the poor man underneath our mask needs help to grow in Christ.

This is the gift of Lent, a true image of ourselves that we receive through contrition, a truthful reflection showing clearly how poor in Spirit we are and how hungry our soul is for God. With a clear understanding of our shortcomings the prayers will feel more natural, not long anymore, not boring, not someone else's words, but real life giving water for a thirsty soul. Loving the others will also come natural when we take down our armor of arrogance, because in humility we'll recognize that we are not superior to our brothers and sisters, but we are all equal under God, equal in weaknesses, equal in sin, equal in needing the mercy of God.

Fasting can change us, can make us blossom like cherry trees in the spring, growing in appreciation of what is in front of us, but we are too busy otherwise to notice. "The springtime of the Fast has dawned, the flower of repentance has begun to open..." (Aposticha, Vespers on Wednesday of Cheesefare Week). Embrace the gift of Lent with its spiritual discipline, confess your sins, pray more, love more, forgive more and a new world of meaning will open calling you higher and higher, closer to God.

But we all, with our face having been unveiled, having beheld the glory of the Lord as in a mirror, are being changed into the same image from glory to glory, even as by the Lord Spirit. (2C0 3:18)

TRADITIONAL PASCHA BASKETS



A very ancient Orthodox custom is the "blessing the family baskets" after the Resurrectional Liturgy on Pascha night.

We have revived this tradition in our Parish. Here are some practical hints.

The basket, is traditionally put together on Holy Saturday morning after the Liturgy of Anticipation [Vesperal Liturgy of St. Basil], and can include all or some of the following: (1) The Easter, or Pascha, loaf of bread; (2) A bottle of red wine; (3) Meats and meat products that may include lamb, sausages, ham etc.; (4) dairy products, such as butter, cheese, and eggs; (5) oil and seasonings; and (6) salt, to represent Christians as "the salt that gives the earth its savor." (7) a lit candle.

Depending on the particular region, the eggs would be prepared and dyed in a traditional manner in the "Resurrection red," and even perhaps marked with a cross, on Holy Thursday. At the Church the family takes the basket to the foot of the Iconostasis. After the Liturgy and all had received Holy Communion, the priest blesses the many baskets and the communal apportionment of the Pascha eggs. Leaving the Church, the whole of the parish or groups of families can gather to share their Pascha eggs, soup, breads and cheese. The remainder foods of the Paschal basket are eaten by the family at home.

May all have a blessed Pascha !


plishments!


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
