# CAPITAL CAMPAIGN COMMITTEE REPORT

By the time the June Forerunner edition is published the dome structure will have been raised and placed atop the supporting steel structure of our new church building. The sight of the dome in place should be an inspiration to all parishioners who have sacrificed to reach this milestone.

As of May 10, 2011, the status of the Capital Campaign / Construction Fund was as follows:

- Construction payments made \$631,750
- Total cost remaining to complete the project, including the building, site work and Stage 1 iconography - \$1,539,436
- Total construction cash balance available -\$456,691
- Total existing capital campaign commitments remaining to be paid - \$760,569
- Additional "new" commitments and cash needed to fully complete the project -\$322,176

Your Capital Campaign Committee has turned to the task of raising the total of commitments and the cash funds needed to complete the project. Our goal is to provide a continuous cash flow to enable completion of the project in 2011. Approximately one-half of our parishioners have committed close to 75% of the funds needed to complete the project and many have already made substantial payments on their commitments. (A list of all individuals and families who have made capital campaign commitments and donations follows this report.) With this record of parish commitment to date, we are hopeful others among our fellow parishioners will also now join in supporting this historic undertaking.

We will be pursuing various approaches to raising the funds needed to complete the project this year including new commitments from as yet uncommitted parishioners, increased existing commitments, accelerated payments on existing commitments and commitments from outside businesses who have supported the parish in the past and with whom we enjoy mutually beneficial relationships. We will also unveil a program of dedications this summer. This will include various spaces in the new Paulos Center Addition and the icons and iconographic murals which are in the Stage 1 Iconography. The dedications program will provide opportunities for parishioners to make special contributions in honor or in memory of loved ones, or who simply want to make a donation for a special purpose or part of the church project, even if anonymously.

Finally, as we have reported to the General Assembly on several occasions, we also have the option of a "bridge loan" and the Committee has begun assessing that option. Should we decide to obtain a small loan to complete the project this year; the details will be explained at a special general assembly.

As a Parish, we are on the way to bringing the vision of "Building Our Future" to reality. If you have not yet made your personal or family commitment to the Capital Campaign, now is the time. Please see any member of the CCC for a commitment card if you have not yet made a commitment. We hope each and every steward and regular attendee of church services and parish events can become a part of making our new church a reality and the names of all who have contributed will be prominently

recognized... If you have already made your personal or family commitment, please consider increasing your commitment and accelerating your payments, as some parishioners have already done, so that we may complete the project this year.

All of our parishioners should want to participate in this historic endeavor and to share in offering glory to God for what we, together, each and every one of us as a Greek Orthodox Community, have accomplished as a lasting legacy and gift to the future generations of St. John the Baptist here in the Dallas/Fort Worth Metroplex.

food and global warming, recycling and other healthy habits but on the other we underestimate the polluting effect that our ever-increasing online presence has on our life in general.

You may very well say I am a hypocrite. After all you read this article on a computer, probably reposted on my blog page, since we stopped printing our magazine for budgetary reasons. I admit, the social media has its perks: it is fast, it connects people, it entertains and so on. The danger however comes not from the technology itself; after all technology is just a tool like any other tool. If the Holy Fathers would have had access to e-mail, I am sure that many of their epistles would have been delivered that way. Who would want to use papyrus if a printer is available, or a horse when one could travel in a car? The danger does not come from the tools themselves, they are neutral, but from how and for what purpose do we use them.

A social network sits on the foundation of a genuinely good intention: to connect people. Facebook has made many high school reunions possible; LinkedIn has helped many people find a job through its web of friends and colleagues, Twitter has kept us abreast with all the events in Asia, the Middle East and other turbulent places on the earth. For many however, especially the younger generation, the social media has almost taken over real life.

By today's unwritten rules of engagement a young person has to be befriended by the right people, has to receive a certain number of likes on their posts and so on in order to merely aspire at a status in the social stratosphere. The pressure is on, as early as elementary school, and is not easy to compete. It is not random that more and more psychologists warn about the epidemic of a new condition called "Facebook depression".

This new ailment cannot be cured just by regulating the access to Internet. This may treat the symptoms but not the cause of the disease. The cause is once more not social media itself. Our youth need something that they think it can be found online: a life with a purpose, a life worth living, a life where one is appreciated and liked. In an online world one has the illusion that this can be obtained much easier that in real life, but, even if this would be true, the real life still needs to be faced with courage and resilience, not hiding one's fears behind a cocky online avatar.

A symbolic milestone has just happened: the raising of the dome structure above the Church. Standing 65 feet tall and ultimately topped with a cross, the dome will serve as a welcome beacon for all to see in the Mid-Cities community.

Although the continuous rain showers in May have hampered construction progress we continue to make great strides. With the dome now set Ashton Wynne will be erecting the wood framing and the true character of the Church will be displayed.

The Building Committee has completed the material selections for the exterior of the Church. Hopefully you have had a chance to view the brick and natural stone combination on the mock-up erected in the parking lot. Our next exterior selections will be concentrated on finalizing the metal roof and exterior glass decorative win-

dows. In the coming months we are also going to be sourcing and selecting interior fin-

ishes in compliance with our stated budget allowances for each item.

# BECOMING A STEWARD IN 2011

You become an Orthodox Christian Steward by giving yourself to Christ, by participating in the Sacramental Life of the church and by giving of your Time, Talent and Treasure; all of which require commitment. A commitment to worship, to attend liturgy and to pray regularly, a commitment to be an active part of your church community giving of your time and talent, and, yes, a commitment to give back a portion of the treasure God has given you - a financial commitment.

A written statement of your intentions is just one of the things that will help you feel committed to Christ and His Church. If we submit nothing in writing it is easy to just walk

away and become a spectator. If, however, we have committed to help support the church, we feel an obligation to do so. That commitment comes by way of our Stewardship Commitment Card.

Filling out a Stewardship Card enables the church to keep a record of the number of parishioners in our congregation, to update addresses and phone numbers that are needed for various purposes and to assess the talents of our parishioners to be utilized when needed. The card is absolutely necessary to determine expected income for budgetary reasons and to create a list of church members who are eligible to vote, serve on the parish council, hold an office, share their talents etc.

So, please, don't stand on the outside looking in. Become an active part of St. John the Baptist community for 2011.

New cards are available in the pews and in the narthex.

Don't be afraid; the card is not a contract, but a promise of intentions. And remember: If your intention is to be a pledged member of St. John, a new card must be submitted each year.

We appreciate everyone's understanding and cooperation in helping to make the stewardship process more meaningful and efficient.

The paradox of social media is that although it thrives on connectivity it promotes isolation. I am in contact with the world, yet, I do not leave my room. An online interaction will never be able to replace human touch; an Internet friend will never substitute for a real friend. It is true however that not all human communities are the same and many do not allow for an easy integration. There is however one community can actually fulfill all our genuine social aspirations: the Church.


The Church is not just an ordinary group of people gathered together, is more that just a crowd, is a community of persons that share the same values and move in

the same direction under the grace of God. The Church is a living organism that has life because the Holy Spirit flows in it from the Father and is accessible to us through the Son that descended on earth and made himself like us.

Jesus Christ knew that the voices of the prophets and the apparition of the angels were not loud enough to reveal what He had to say to us. So He chose to come in our midst, to become flesh so our interaction would be complete. If we have life today it is because Christ has given it to us by coming in the world unmediated.

This is the beautiful truth of Christianity, that we do not relate to a distant God, a God that is impersonal or does not care, we are in communion with a God that offers Himself to us, again and again, in every Eucharist we celebrate, uniting into His Body all those that partake of Him.

This is the only social network that will offer us the perfect life we desperately seek on the Internet. It is the only community that will accept us as we are, with our weaknesses and imperfections, offering us understanding, support and hope. The cure of the social media depression can be found only through a willful and joyful integration in the Body of Christ. In Him we never die, even if we leave Facebook, but we are given the opportunity to live forever a perfect life that is not a click away, but a prayer away.



#### FROM THE DESERT FATHERS - ON HUMILITY


An old man was asked, "What is humility?" and he said in reply, "Humility is a great work, and a work of God. The way of humility is to undertake bodily labor and believe yourself a sinner and make yourself subject to all." Then a brother said, "What does it mean, to be subject to all?" The old man answered, "To be subject to all is not to give your attention to the sins of others but always to give your attention to your own sins and to pray without ceasing to God."

An old man said, "Every time a thought of superiority or

vanity moves you, examine your conscience to see if you have kept all the commandments, whether you love your enemies, whether you consider yourself to be an unprofitable servant and the greatest sinner of all. Even so, do not pretend to great ideas as though you were perfectly right, for that thought destroys everything."

As abba Macarius was returning to his cell from the marsh carrying palm-leaves, the devil met him with a sharp sickle and would have struck him but he could not. He cried out, "Great is the vio-

lence I suffer from you, Macarius, for when I want to hurt you, I cannot. But whatever you do, I do and more also. You fast now and then, but I am never refreshed by any food; you often keep vigil, but I never fall asleep. Only in one thing are you better than I am and I acknowledge that." Macarius said to him, "What is that?" and he replied, "It is because of your humility alone that I cannot overcome you."


Christ plaque and stand.






