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THE FREEDOM OF MORALITY AND THE IMMORALITY OF FREEDOM

The recent overthrowing of the authoritarian governments from the Middle East countries has brought up again the importance of freedom as an essential human value. The notion of freedom however is not as easy to define as one would think. In general we understand that freedom means the capacity to act without any outside restraint. As J. Rufus Fears, professor of Classics and chair in History of Liberty at the University of Oklahoma, asserts, this concept can be applied to a nation for example that is free from any outside domination, can be applied to a political system, meaning that one can elect its own choice of government, but most importantly can be applied to the individual that is free to live by any values as long as it does not harm others.



These three levels of liberty may not coexist at the same time, some may have political liberty but be subject to a greater multi-national power, others may have national freedom but have their individual liberties restricted and so on. In America we are blessed with all three, we live in an independent nation, we thrive in political democracy and we also enjoy individual freedom to live our lives as we please.

Unlike in the Middle East for instance, where individual freedom is severely restricted, for us



The loan preparation process was virtually complete as of the third week of October with closing of the loan expected before end of October. By the time you read this we should have the additional \$400,000 available to complete the New Church project, which is Phase III of the capital development program (CDP). As expressed at the Special General Assembly, we will work on paying off this loan as quickly as possible with the goal of no more than three (3) years to retirement of the loan... We are fortunate to have Worthington Bank as our financing partner for the remainder of the CDP. With offices in Colleyville and Fort Worth, Worthington Bank is eager to work with the Parish to support our capital needs and we are looking forward to a long term beneficial relationship.

In addition to the request for bridge loan approval, the Special General Assembly was introduced to the Ecclesiastical Dedications Program with the goal of funding all Stage One items including the Iconostasis, Iconostasis Icons and Altar Vault and Apse Iconography. About one-half of \$220,000 needed to complete Stage One has already been committed to by members of the Parish in an outpouring of support for the Program, but there are many opportunities remaining for families and individuals to commit to the Dedications Program in honor or memory of loved ones or for any special purpose. In addition to ecclesiastical items, Dedications Program also includes the offices, classrooms and conference room of the new Paulos Center Addition which will become part of the Community Center after the future completion of Phase IV of the ongoing Capital Development Program. Look for Dedications Program information in church or see Fr. Vasile, George Vittas or any member of the Capital Campaign Committee with your commitment or any questions you may have.

As a Parish, we are confidently on the way to bringing the vision of "Building Our Future" to reality. Please continue to make your existing Capital Cam-

paign Commitment payments as planned or, if you have not yet made your personal or family commitment to the Capital Campaign, now is the perfect time. Please see any member of the CCC for a commitment card. The names of all who have contributed will be prominently and permanently recognized in the narthex of the new church. All parishioners should want to participate in this historic endeavor and share in offering glory to God for what we will have accomplished as a lasting legacy and gift to the future generations of St. John the Baptist here in the Dallas/Fort Worth Metroplex.

liberty is such a commonplace concept that many times it is perverted into a straightforward libertarian attitude: I can do whatever I want, whenever I want, with whomever I want. Any attempt to fall back to any type of morality system is seen today by more and more people as retrograde and severely limiting the capacity of expression of the individual. Therefore even in a Church context the necessity to consistently abide to a guiding principle of morality makes many people uncomfortable.

The root of this anxiety may lie within the cultural acceptance of morality through the prism of Western theology that defines sin in very legalistic terms. Sin is a breaking of the divine law, consequently alienating the sinner from a God offended by the lack of obedience. This type of morality is but a code of law that man is obligated to follow or severe


consequences will dawn upon him. The capacity of man to act as a free agent is severely restricted, as he has no choice but to obey for fear of punishment. How does this line up however with the concept of free will that was gifted to man from his creation? Does free will actually mean "obey or else"?

The Fathers of the Church have a different approach to the concepts of sin and free will. In their understanding every man was created with free will and with a distinctive existence, but not created to live independently, following one's individualistic goals, but to live in communion with God and his fellow men. This is the mystery of the person. A person cannot be defined in isolation, but only in communion with others, following the model of the three persons of the Trinity.

Communion with God however means also that man's will should be aligned with God's will in a perfect synergy leading to eternal union with Him. But this existential necessity does not in any way restrict the freedom of man, he is not coerced into an arranged marriage with God, but is called to choose this relationship out of free will. By accepting this reality man acknowledges in fact that his existence is relational, and that his purpose as a person is only fulfilled by being together with God. Man has the free will to ignore this reality, of course, but bearing the existential repercussions of the renunciation of the very purpose of his being.

Love is what ultimately explains everything. God loves man and awaits that man would freely love Him back, does not force man to love him, otherwise this could not be called love. Sin therefore is not just a dry breaking of a law externally imposed, but is in fact a rebellion against what we actually are, a deliberate rejection of the purpose of our creation, a

BUILDING COMMITTEE REPORT

Progress is continuing with the framing work around the main dome which has been quite a challenge for Ashton Wynne due to its intricate form and elevation. The interior scaffolding system has proven to be a great benefit to the contractors in performing their work over 50 feet above the foundation.

We are working with Ashton Wynne to have them create an updated project schedule all the way to project completion and issuance of our Certificate of Occupancy. Once completed, we will make it available for all parishioners to view.

A Building Committee meeting is scheduled with the roof installation firm to review their installation strategy for constructing the domes, apses and eyebrow trim around the high windows. Travertine tile finish selection has occurred, as well as the decorative lighting. November will be a busy month for selecting many of the other finish items and equipment for the

project including door hardware, tile, carpet, wood flooring, interior and parking lighting, monument signage, etc.

Our thanks to Ashton Wynne for preparing the grounds for the 2011 Festival. It was quite an endeavor to host our Greek Food Festival around a construction site but well worth the end result.

Finally, look for upcoming announcements on the planned demolition of our parking lot in preparation for the new, larger concrete parking lot.


Why must I commit to give a specific amount?

Knowing the amount of your monetary participation helps


our parish plan the activities throughout the year. Your monetary stewardship is kept in the strictest of confidence.

What if I cannot fulfill my stewardship commitment?



- Nov. 20 Converting to Orthodoxy – Joe Sullivan



mankind; morality is the deep realization of who we are and what is the very goal of our existence.

The result of the rigidity of Western theological thought is the current indiscriminative rejection of morality all together. A recent study among the youth revealed that they are unwilling to follow any type of morality, Christian or not, and their decision-making process is guided mostly by the ephemeral emotional impulses of the moment. Their rejection of

morality lies in a fundamental misunderstanding of their own existence that in the contemporary secular context has been delinked from its divine purpose and constrained within the walls of the material world. Without a higher spiritual purpose life becomes a random event they have to make the best of, and freedom means having no rules and boundaries, just doing what "feels" right, without any outlook to the consequences: in other words an immoral freedom.

The freedom of morality and the immorality of freedom

From the perspective of the Fathers freedom is to willfully acknowledge who we are and act according to the purpose of our creation, not against it. The Church is guiding its members not toward her own ambitions but is trying to help them discover who they are and help them grow into what God meant them to be. To stay within the boundaries of the Christian morality is to have the freedom to be who we actually are, unconstrained by the requirements of a perverted society that is trying to say we are somebody else. We are free only in God, only when we fulfill our potential as persons, when we follow the path of theosis toward union with Him.

SAINT KATHERINE THE GREAT MARTYR AND ALL-WISE

Katherine was the daughter of King Constus. After the death of her father, she lived with her mother in Alexandria. Her mother was secretly a Christian who, through her spiritual father, brought Katherine to the Christian Faith.

In a vision, St. Katherine received a ring from the Lord Jesus Himself as a sign of her betrothal to Him. This ring remains on her finger even today.

Katherine was greatly gifted by God and was well educated in Greek philosophy, medicine, rhetoric and logic. In addition to that, she was of unusual physical beauty.

When the iniquitous Emperor Maxentius offered sacrifices to the idols and ordered others to do the same, Katherine boldly confronted the emperor and denounced his idolatrous errors. The emperor, seeing that she was greater than he in wisdom and knowledge, summoned fifty of his wisest men to debate with her on matters of faith and to put her to shame. Catherine outwitted and shamed them. In a rage, the emperor ordered all fifty of those men burned. By St. Katherine's prayers, all fifty confessed the name of Christ and declared themselves Christians before their execution.

After Katherine had been put in prison, she converted the emperor's commander, Porphyrius, and two hundred soldiers to the true Faith, as well as Empress Augusta-Vasilissa herself. They all suffered for Christ.

During the torture of St. Kathe-

rine, an angel of God came to her and destroyed the wheel on which the holy virgin was being tortured. Afterward, the Lord Jesus Christ Himself appeared to her and comforted her.

After many tortures, Katherine was beheaded at the age of eighteen, on November 24, 310. Milk, instead of blood, flowed from her body. Her miracleworking relics repose on Mount Sinai.

At the requests of the Church and Monastery of Sinai, the feast of St. Katherine, their patron, is now celebrated on November 25th so it might be celebrated more festively together with the leave-taking of the Presentation of the Theotokos.

HYMN OF PRAISE: The Holy Great-Martyr Katherine

The wise Katherine, an earthly princess,

Became a martyr for Christ the Savior.

Foolish Maxentius offered her life:

If she would consent to become his wife!

The holy Katherine, pure as gold,

Apolytikion in the Plagal of the First Tone


