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

Council Capsule

My Fellow Parishioners,

This has been a busy month for the Church Council. We have been briefed by the Planning Committee on their task to develop a concept, specifications, and a rough magnitude of costs for building a new church here on our current property.

The majority of the Council approved the briefing for presentation at the 15 June General Assembly meeting. Also, I will bring you up to speed on the status of the gas lease for our property at that time.

You may have noticed that we have a new trash container on our location. The Council approved our renting it along with a weekly pick up. We absolutely had to do something about the large plastic bags of near the church. Not only was that unsightly, it was a potential health issue for us and the city.

Once we decide where the container will be situated, we will insist that everyone use it. Please do what you can to insure that all trash is placed in a trash container. We have had issues with children and even grown-ups leaving trash on the tables in the hall or on the grounds of our church. It would be a great help if all of us picked up after ourselves.

The golf tournament that was scheduled for 5 May was canceled due to inclement weather. Bill Wright has rescheduled the tournament for 18 August and has done an outstanding job of insuring that this will be our best one ever! Please plan to participate.

The preparation for the annual food festival is moving right along. However, we still need to fill some of the critical chairmanship positions. Please look at the festival information posted in the hall and help us fill those positions.

I will most likely get criticism for my next comment, but I do feel it needs to be addressed. It is extremely distracting to have a constant stream of children going in and out of the Church during the services. This seems to have increased lately. I noticed that the same children come in and out. While everyone understands that some of this traffic is unavoidable, it is disturbing people and does distract from the beauty of the services. Please be sensitive to this in consideration of the holiness of the service and of your fellow parishioners.

Along that line, we have reminded the ushers that no one is to be admitted at certain times of the Liturgy. For example, during the Great Procession, the Creed, The Lord's Prayer, and when Fr. Vasile is giving the sermon. The ushers will stand in the entrance way as a reminder that no one is to enter at that time.

We have recently purchased some great new tables for the hall. I believe that all of you will agree that this has vastly improved the appearance and utility for our various activities. However, someone put several of our new tables outside the hall overnight. We were fortunate that no one stole the tables this time. Please be careful that this does not happen again.

I want to end this on a high note so let me thank Philoptochos, the Sunday School, the Ageless Wonders, and the Council for their sponsorship of the weekly coffee hours. Their efforts have been outstanding!

The Parish By-laws state that we <u>MUST</u> have a quorum and, in order to approve any proposal, we need to have **two- thirds** of those in attendance <u>vote</u> in favor_of the proposal. In other words, you can not sign in and then leave before the vote. The issues being discussed are monumental to the progress of our church therefore we need every eligible member to attend. Please remember, in order to vote you must be a member in good standing.

Father Vasile's Message

Orthodox Architecture - making history in America today Any pilgrimage to the "old" Orthodox countries

is not complete if one does not visit some of the historical Churches built with much faith, dedication and love by our forefathers. Who can

and not visit Lavra Pecerskaya, who can go to Romania and not visit the monasteries of Bukovina? These gems, preserved with many sacrifices through the centuries, continue to attract admirers, not only among the Orthodox, t but also from people of other religious beliefs. They have something to say beyond the stone and the crafts, something spiritually deep that transcends their exterior beauty. On iee Why do I mention all this you may ask? The answer is simple, because living as an Orthodox in America I miss the churches from the old country. With few notable excentions most of the

country. With few notable exceptions most of the Orthodox Churches in America do not even remotely resemble with a traditional Orthodox structure. We can invoke the lack of money, we can invoke the lack of engagement of the faithful, but the result is the same, we have started to loose the meaning of a traditional Church sacred space.

go to Constantinople and not visit Hagia Sophia, who can go to Thessaloniki and not visit the

Church of Saint Demetrios, who can go to Kiev

Because we live in a soup of thousands of different so called Christian denominations, we, the Orthodox, are in danger of loosing our identity that was so dearly preserved across the centuries by generations of martyrs. You hear people asking nowadays: why do we need to build traditional Churches? Why do we need domes, vaults apses and the sort? This is a waste of money; a cheap square building with generous space for pews should be enough to worship God!

Nothing can be more wrong than this. An Orthodox worship space cannot be conceived without these features. The domes, vaults, apses and icons are all intimately and permanently attached to the idea of being Orthodox. They are not just simple architectural elements, stripped of any essential significance like other human creations, but rather they are eternal and true expressions of the One and Holy Spirit of the Orthodox Faith. Nothing in the Orthodox sacred space is done without due consideration, nothing is superficial, but all has a meaning and a distinct purpose.

All the architectural elements are meant to introduce the faithful that enter therein in a state of prayer and heavenly admiration. The domes have been created using the pattern of the heavens that stand above us expressing through their majesty the Byzantine idea that Church has a world-wide mission. The vaults and the apses represent the rainbow, the covenant between God and Noah, but also the loving embrace of Mother Church. This is why in the Apse of the altar you always find represented the Mother of God, spreading her arms toward a humanity in need of her divine love and care. The icons that cover every inch of the walls represent true windows to the Kingdom of Heaven as they reveal to the faithful the transfigured world depicted in them.

Even in the worst times of war and suppression, the Churches were adorned with gold and most precious materials and craftsmanship, because the space of the Church is a representation of the Jerusalem from above, the Kingdom of heaven where even the poorest man on earth, if has faith, can enter and rejoice as a king in union with Christ the King of all! The Church building itself is a promise for a better world where nothing is missing, where everything is fulfilled. We adorn the Churches not for the pride of men, but as a promise of the future life and Kingdom.

Knowing all this we come to understand that the closed space of the Temple opens in fact thousands of doors to the other world above, a world that awaits us to join them into eternal life.

Through our traditional architecture we have something important to communicate. Now, more than ever, the Orthodox architecture is not a simple "nice to have" but is a "must". We are called to make again history today, to be brave and visionary builders like the emperors of Volume XXIV No.6 Constantinople. Of course we don't have their means, but that does not imply that we need to abandon our traditions. One single person cannot do much, but as a community we can accomplish together so much more. We have to wisely seek the balance between tradition and resources so we can create something that will meaningfully express and preserve our wonderful heritage.

Above all we need to understand that nothing, and especially a Church, can be built without sacrifice, without reassessing our priorities in life. The churches of old were built on the sacrifice of our martyrs; the churches today have to be built on the sacrifice of our frivolous pleasures and the re-channeling of our resources toward what really matters for us today and for our children tomorrow. Only upon this communal sacrificial act we'll be able to build a Church that will endure, uniting us all into Christ our God.

Starting on June 22nd we'll switch to the summer schedule for the Sunday Services. We'll start Orthros at 8:00AM and the Holy Liturgy at 9:00 AM. This we'll allow us to avoid the midday summer heat and to better accommodate the holiday activities. We'll resume our normal schedule on September 7th.

Choir Notes

When Bill Poletes asked me to write the Choir Notes for June I didn't hesitate at all. He said that I could write about anything. I thought it would be easy. I was wrong! When faced with the prospect of writing about "anything" my mind became frozen. Just what did I want to write about? Bill should have given me a topic. Oh, wait a minute, he did suggest a topic...so, here goes.

I started going to Holy Trinity Orthodox Church in Dallas around 1982. I converted when Bishara and I got married in 1984. I still remember how the music affected me from the very first time that I entered the Church. Back then, virtually all of the Hymns were sung in Greek and most of the readings were still done in Greek. I didn't know any Greek at all (not even "Opa"), but the music moved me. It literally spoke to my soul. I started trying to sing the hymns along with the Choir from where I sat. Eventually I thought about joining the Choir, but

I was not very confidant since I don't read music. I remember an out of state visitor told me one time not to join the choir. She told me that it was inspiring to those sitting in the congregation to hear me sing. After Holy Trinity moved to their present location, Bishara and I started coming to St. John's. After a few years, I asked Bill about joining the Choir. He graciously consented. Music has always been an important part of my life. I know that the Church Hymnology played a major role in my conversion to Orthodoxy. At a time when language was somewhat of a barrier to my understanding the Liturgy; the music of the Church filled a huge void in my soul and life. I consider it a privilege to sing those hymns that continue to move me with the fine group of men and women that are St. John the Baptist's Choir.

Practical Faith What's all this commotion?

For a first comer in an Orthodox Church the first contact with an Orthodox service may be a little bit peculiar. During the early part of the service the church may seem to be in a hubbub, with people walking up to the front of the church, praying in front of the iconostasis (the standing icons in front of the altar), kissing things and lighting candles, even though the service is already going on. In fact, when you came in the service was already going on, although the sign outside clearly said "Divine Liturgy, 10:00." You felt embarrassed to apparently be late, but these people are even later, and they're walking all around inside the church. What's going on here? Volume XXIV No.6

In an Orthodox church there is only one Eucharistic service (Divine Liturgy) per Sunday, and it is preceded by an hour-long service of Matins (or Orthros) and several short preparatory services before that. There is no break between these services-one begins as soon as the previous ends, and posted starting times are just educated guesses. Sometimes the "official" 10:00 o'clock start of the Liturgy could actually be 10:10 or 10:15, based on the length of the hymns chanted during Orthros. These Hymns vary from Sunday to Sunday; therefore the starting times of the Liturgy are only approximate. Altogether, the priest will be at the altar on Sunday morning for over three hours, "standing in the flame," as one Orthodox priest put it.

As a result of this state of continuous flow, there is no point at which everyone is sitting quietly in a pew waiting for the entrance hymn to start, glancing at their watches approaching 10:00. Orthodox worshippers arrive at any point from the beginning of Matins through the early part of the Liturgy, a span of well over an hour. No matter when they arrive, something is sure to be already going on, so Orthodox don't let this hamper them from going through their private prayers when entering a church. This is distracting to newcomers, and may even seem disrespectful, but soon you begin to recognize it as an expression of a faith that is not merely formal but very personal.

Of course, there is still no good excuse for showing up after 10:00, but punctuality is unfortunately one of the few virtues many Orthodox lack...but we're working on it!
